
BookTrust Lifetime Achievement Award




John Burningham and Helen Oxenbury have won the first-ever double BookTrust Lifetime Achievement Award.

John Burningham is famous for books such as *Borka: The Adventures of a Goose with No Feathers*, *Husherbye* and *Avocado Baby and Grandpa*, which tackles important issues such as bereavement. Helen Oxenbury, meanwhile, is best known for illustrating titles such as *The Three Little Wolves*, *Ten Little Fingers and Ten Little Toes* and *We're Going on a Bear Hunt*.

The couple, who married in 1964, have won several literary awards individually but have only collaborated on one book together, *There's Going to be a Baby*, published by Walker in 2010.




Vismaya Pillai and George Johnson Jones (Year 7) have both had their short stories chosen for a Stranger Sagas publication, a competition run by Young Writers. They both submitted mini sagas, a story in just 100 words, and were delighted when they found out that their mini sagas had been chosen from the 20,000 entries that were also submitted. Hans Christian Anderson Award

The Hans Christian Andersen Award is the highest international distinction given to authors and illustrators of children's books. Given every other year by IBBY, the awards recognize lifelong achievements and are given to an author and an illustrator whose complete works have made an important, lasting contribution to children's literature. The winning author was Eiko Kadono of Japan whose stories are deeply rooted in Japan and show us a Japan that is filled with all kinds of unexpected people. The winning illustrator was Igor Oleynikov of Russia, who brings an extraordinary cast of characters to life –from young boys and girls, to witches and giants, to wolves and sharks, to fairies and trolls. Congratulations to both winners.
